As an undergraduate student, he was passionate about computer programming and publishing tools. As a Howard Hughes Medical Institute fellow, he used computer graphics to model a small protein.

After graduating from The Ohio State University with a Ph.D. degree in chemistry, Terry moved on to teach full-time at some of the most prestigious public universities, including his alma mater and University of Virginia. With yearly enrollment of up to 2000 students, he worked closely with Student Disability Services to support students' needs and meet the compliance requirements. #### Bio:

A native of Chicago and the Humboldt Park Community, Santana was admitted as an undergraduate student through the CHANCE program at NIU and earned her Bachelor's in Education with an emphasis in Special Education. A couple of years later, she returned to NIU and earned her Master's in Adult and Higher Education with an emphasis in Student Affairs. Currently, Jocelyn is pursuing her doctoral degree in adult and higher education and is ABD. Her research focuses on identity development of undocumented Latino college students. Jocelyn's commitment to diversity work has definitely inspired her research.

Santana is a bilingual higher education professional with a passion for supporting students in their development, achievement of their goals, and progress toward self-actualization as global and diverse citizens. Therefore, as a diversity educator, Jocelyn is excited to work with campus partners to discuss the barriers and benefits encountered in building inclusive spaces, allyship, and raising awareness of oppressive practices and systems. Education is a first step in gaining cultural competence and

awareness. She believes the work must continue individually and institutionally as we work collaboratively to move the needle forward and ensure everyone has an equitable and accessible environment.

Throughout the years, Santana has worked on different cultural initiatives at NIU, including serving as a speaker for the De Mujer a Mujer Women's Leadership Conference, completing Ally Training for Undocumented Students, and serving as a facilitator for the Dialogue on Diversity initiative. In 2013, Santana partnered with the Latino Resource Center to execute the inaugural Reverse Diversity Career Fair, which connected diverse student groups to employers. This event has proven successful for showcasing the diverse student organizations on campus as well as their transferable leadership experiences that positively contribute to the community. Most recently, Santana presented at the Tenth International Congress of Qualitative Inquiry and discussed issues impacting undocumented students in higher education. Currently, Jocelyn is working on an article to publish with ACLU on building cultural competence and leadership for student organizations.

Prior to NIU, Santana provided leadership for Waubonsee Community College's Minority Transfer Center at the Sugar Grove Campus and the Learning Assessment and Testing Center in Aurora. In these roles, she collaborated with campus partners to support students of color in their transition from two- to fouryear institutions, explored best placement testing practices for ESL adult learners' academic transitions, delivered workshops in English and Spanish, and co-planned programming for Women's History, Black History, and Hispanic Heritage months. Santana also coordinated college visits to Historically Black Colleges and Universities and Predominately Hispanic Serving Institutions. In addition, she served as the Faculty Advisor for Latinos Unidos, African Cultural Alliance, and completed LGBTQ Ally Training.
