3. Dr. Aaron Lawler, Assistant Professor of Humanities, has been selected as the 2020 Outstanding Faculty Member!

Dr. Lawler has served Waubonsee as a full-time Humanities instructor since 2012. In his nomination response, Dr. Lawler writes about education being sacred, about education as the key for solving problems, for making individuals and society better. He acknowledges his own mentors who helped him to realize that "every class, every reading, every assignment should challenge the student's preconceived notions about the world, and should shape new, life-changing ideas and insights. If the student is internalizing the information, and truly incorporating the ideas into their understanding of the world, then the student must walk away somehow different. That is how we know education works." He goes on to say that he is "hopeful that we [educators] can make our community the kind of place where we combat ignorance, take intellectual risks, and champion the cause of civilizing in an uncivilized world."
