## **ABOUT ACUE**

### Waubonsee and ACUE

Waubonsee Community College provided the faculty participating in the certificate program the option to enroll in the ACE Graduate Credit Course, *The Fundamentals of Teaching and Learning in Higher Education.* The faculty who pursued this option engaged in additional graduate-level coursework, including the development of First Day and Interactive Class Session Plans, Peer Review of Class Session Plans, a Comprehensive Syllabus Assignment, Teaching Philosophy, and Teaching ePortfolio. Completion of these assignments with a B or better provided course takers with three graduate credits transcripted by ACE. For full-time faculty, Waubonsee approved these graduate credits for application towards columnar advancement.

### Waubonsee's Historic First Cohort

Waubonsee Community College prides itself on thinking forward in an always evolving educational climate. "Change is the only constant," our president, Dr. Christine Sobek, reminds us in the most recent strategic plan for our institution. Building from a rich history of transformational thinking, Waubonsee strives to develop three primary pillars: 1) student equity and success, 2) community connections, and 3) employee and organizational excellence. Evidence from our first historic cohort demonstrates that

partnering with ACUE is successful for instructors, thus our students, and meets all three of our strategic pillars as we move forward.

When Waubonsee's partnership with ACUE began, the college was actively working towards closing achievement gaps for African-American, Latinx, and low-income (Pelleligible) students as part of the Illinois Equity in Attainment (ILEA) initiative. Waubonsee joined forces with fellow ILEA colleagues from the College of Lake County and ACUE to prioritize equitable and inclusive teaching practices within the course framework. ACUE's flexibility and support in this endeavor helped to ensure that Waubonsee could continue addressing the needs of the aforementioned student groups as well as meet the goals of its Educational Affairs, Equity, and Strategic Plans.

Our historic first cohort was comprised of half adjunct faculty and half full-time faculty, ranging in disciplines from math to nursing and everything in between. This diverse cohort concretely demonstrated that ACUE's effective teaching practices not only aided content experts in learning educational practices but in furthering all educators on their lifelong learning journey— in extraordinary circumstances.

Of course, no instructor in higher education could have predicted the sudden pivot to virtual learning that became necessary in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic. Our faculty were creative, resilient, and steadfast in their commitment to excellence and to their students. They implemented the online resources already embedded in the ACUE course and embraced the Online Teaching Toolkit© that ACUE made available to educators nationwide. In true fellowship, ACUE understood that our faculty's priority must be our students and our collective health, wellness, and safety. Cohort members were granted the time and space needed to prioritize their well-being and complete their spring courses, returning to the ACUE course when they were able. We, as Facilitators, were amazed by their perseverance. We anticipated a positive inaugural cohort experience but had no idea just how meaningful it would be to share ideas and collaborate—to maintain our sense of community—in these uncertain times. We remain committed to maintaining this culture of excellence from our proof that partnering with ACUE is transformationally successful.

Whether through the lens of employee and organizational excellence, community connections or student equity and success, this union exemplifies our strategic plan. Like Waubonsee, ACUE is evolving with the educational climate while remaining true to the abundance of literature regarding effective teaching practices.
