In addition to being a full and part-time faculty member for many years, Dr. Brown has found success as a Department Chair, Director of Global Studies, Associate Dean of Arts and Sciences, Faculty Development Facilitator, Instructional Designer, and Learning Design Coach. He is currently the Instructor Manager for ThriveDX, a cybersecurity education provider. Dr. Brown received his B.S. in Anthropology and M.S. in Sociology from Illinois State University.
