The first activity highlighted is "Sports Nutrition Olympics". Throughout the semester, students compete in their chosen groups for weekly medals (gold, silver or bronze) and their team medals are ceremoniously awarded during the weekly pinning ceremony. The second activity "Escape Box" is an in-class activity where students complete ten subsequent Olympic Missions to crack codes and solve puzzles with the objective to gain access into the final box. The third activity Paper Airplane Factory is to promote learning operations management through play. This activity teaches essential operations management concepts through the collaborative process of designing, building, and testing paper airplanes. The Fourth activity featured is "New Product Development". Over the course of the semester, student teams work collaboratively to create a new product and develop a comprehensive marketing strategy. Promoting gamification and classroom competition, these activities not only make learning enjoyable but promote a positive and inclusive classroom environment, all while assessing student learning.
